Sargeant - At - Arms, Explained by Craig Smith

A Little History

In line with President George's theme of keeping tradition alive while adding some progressive thinking, Here are some insights on the SAA, abbreviation for Sergeant-At-Arms. First, let's get our prepositions straight... it's not sergeant with arms, sergeant about arms and certainly not sergeant without arms.

Sergeant-At-Arms is a traditional component of our regular Kiwanis meetings. In the early 1980's the sergeants' material consisted primarily of newspaper clippings and the SAA stood at the podium and shared recent news or events that Kiwanis members were a part of. The fine back then was 25 cents and you brought your quarter up to the front tables where the entire board of directors sat. Once in a while you found a frugal member like B.L. Robinson who would only pay a dime and never any more than that for his fine. In current years, Boast, Bull and Brag has become a popular tradition.

For many years, the dollars that the sergeant brought in were actually part of the annual budget and the sergeant was on task each week to bring in a portion of that budgeted amount. When our club had over 200 members it was not uncommon for the SAA to have to wrangle 2200-2500 dollars per year from the thrifty pockets of the members or approximately 40-50 dollars each week!

In the early 2000's the comedic bit became a part of the SAA landscape and you can probably thank Dave Vavroch for his part in adding some shenanigans to the routine. Following those years, the skits and acts and group fines became more and more common as the articles and trade magazines gave way to new ways to include the members.

It is notable that many officers and directors have cut their teeth as the SAA and it is often a springboard for getting involved in the next level of Kiwanis leadership. Recently we have had dual positions and shared responsibilities as the role requires steady attendance and that is not always easy in our busy scheduled lives.

The sergeant's role is now an attempt to entertain you and to take your money while you are still smiling. They are asked to be creative, informative, clever, a bit ornery and perhaps even jovial as they strive to make you grin while you're handing over a dollar or 2. I like to think of it as hitting you over the head with a velvet hammer...trust me, it won't hurt too much.

A Few Reminders

*If your name is mentioned, please stand up and bring your dollar forward. That's the game and that's the way we play it. Just putting the dollar on the table is fine for group fines or table fines but when you are mentioned, consider it an honor and a gracious way to support our club.

*If you must leave a meeting early, its gonna cost you a dollar to step out on the meeting, the speaker & the SAA.

*Of course the big fine is for the cell phone that goes off during the meeting. \$5 is the rate for that important

call interrupting our meeting. Some Sergeants have even charged \$5 for a call that went off at a board meeting.

Let's Not Forget

Overall it's a time for us to recognize our influential members in our community as well as a chance to laugh, groan, giggle, chortle, guffaw or even cringe a bit while letting all the busyness of life go away for just a few minutes. Sometimes the sergeant hits their stride and it adds a lot of fun to our meetings. Other times the best laid plans go awry when certain people you planned to pick on don't make it to the meeting or a joke lands with a thud and the crowd doesn't respond as you hoped. Its never fun to disappoint our Kiwanis friends so hang in there when we don't land on our feet with the most professional act that brings the house down each week. It's a tough job, and it takes time to prepare each week, but it's also a special part of our meeting that most members look forward to. If vou'd like to give it a shot sometime, please volunteer and we'll give it a go.

How Can You Help?

Finally, there are a few things you can do to help the sergeant. Got a good tip on a member? Let the sergeant know. Heard a good joke or a one liner? Share it with the SAA in a simple e-mail. It the sergeant asks you to join a skit or get in on a joke, please jump in. Anyone can add to the fun. And remember this...if you happen to see your license plate in the sergeant's hand someday, don't grumble, it's only a dollar to get it back and after all, its tradition.

Your Directors and Officers met and have approved the following funding requests at the last board meeting.

The following are services and programs of the Kiwanis Club:

The Dictionary & Thesaurus Committee will continue to give area school children books and was funded at \$1,500.

Coats For Kids continues to be a project of the club. Donations will be sought from area businesses and the club will supplement with \$3,000.

Aid to the Needy, which is known as the Nurses Program, where school nurses can purchase necessary items for children in need, \$542.15.

The Holiday Shopping Spree at Target will continue and each child will be given \$50 to spend.

Outside Organization Funding Requests:

Change a Child's Story was awarded \$1,800 to be used to purchase 600 children's books for 450 school-aged children, K-5 th grade, in the Mediapolis Community School District

Club News:

Additionally, the board discussed giving members their own aprons and these will also be given to members when they join the club. The club will purchase 125 aprons to start at a cost of \$1,250.
